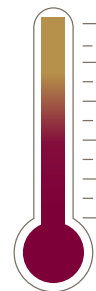

Global ties, local impact — the strength of alumni connections

In this special interview, we speak with Hutchins Old Boy Stuart Valentine ('75), who lives overseas and remains connected to the School. It was a pleasure to welcome him back to campus during a recent visit to Tasmania. His story highlights the importance of international giving and the lasting bond Old Boys share with the School, no matter where life leads them.

Can you tell us a bit about your connection to The Hutchins School and what it means to you, even from overseas?

Having spent 13 years at Hutchins, the School has had a profound influence on my life, and I owe much of who I am today — my values and outlook on the world — to my years there. I still remember the names of every one of my teachers, from Grade 1A in the Junior School to Upper Sixth. Many of them had larger-than-life personalities that left a lasting impression — not just through their words and actions, but through their behaviour and example. And, of course, the friendships I made at school were equally significant. Some of those connections remain very important to me even now, despite having lived overseas for most of my adult life.

What inspired you to continue supporting Hutchins after leaving Australia?

I wanted to give something back to the School that helped me get where I am today. Hutchins opened my eyes to the wider world — both in terms of mindset and geography — which has been instrumental in shaping my career path.

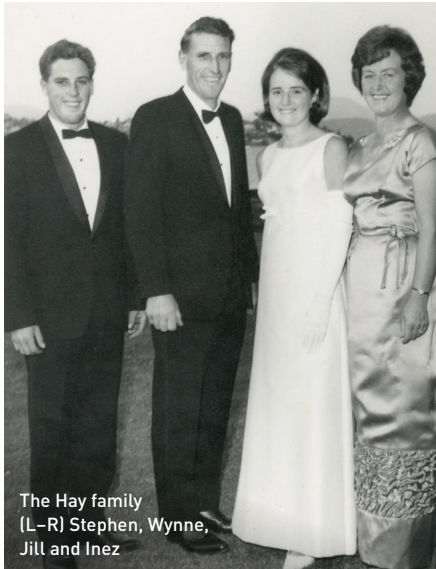
How do alumni events help foster connections between Old Boys who are far from home?

I think many of us who live overseas, even for much of our working lives as I have, still consider Tasmania home and Hutchins is an inseparable part of that. Alumni events provide a unique opportunity to reconnect with those roots. Meeting up with other Old Boys, regardless of age or background, creates a sense of stability and connection — a reminder of where we all started, no matter how unpredictable life's journey has been.

How would you encourage other alumni, especially those living overseas, to get involved and support Hutchins?

Firstly, I'd encourage alumni to attend an event — or better yet, to offer to host or help organise one. Even among Old Boys from different generations, there's a strong sense of shared history and connection. Secondly, I'd suggest giving back through a gift to the School, acknowledging the role Hutchins played in your life by contributing to enhanced facilities or programs for new generations of Hutchins students as they find their own way in the world. 🌟

Honouring the past, inspiring the future — Stephen Hay Memorial Park



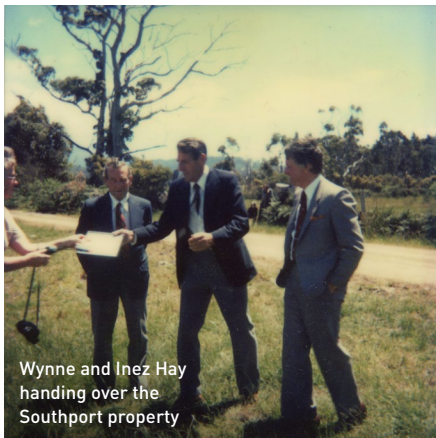

Philanthropy is woven into the fabric of The Hutchins School, shaping its past, present and future. Without the generosity of those who have shared their resources, vision and love for education, the School we know today would simply not exist. Among the many stories of giving that have defined our history, the establishment of the Stephen Hay Memorial Park (Southport) is a shining example of how philanthropy creates lasting legacies.

In 1981, Mr Wynne and Mrs Inez Hay made an extraordinary gesture of generosity in memory of their son, Stephen. Following Stephen's untimely death as a result of a car accident in 1967, they donated a six-acre parcel of land at Southport to The Hutchins School. This cherished space, officially named the Stephen Hay Memorial Park, was gifted to The Hutchins Foundation at a special ceremony on 4 December 1981, with Mrs Inez Hay officially handing over the gift.

This remarkable act of giving was more than the transfer of land, it was a deeply personal tribute that turned grief into a gift for the generations of Hutchins students who would benefit from this space. To this day, the Stephen Hay Memorial Park continues to serve as a place of reflection, community and connection with nature—a legacy of love and commitment to the values of The Hutchins School.

The story of the Stephen Hay Memorial Park reflects the profound belief that philanthropy can honour the past while enriching the future. The generosity of the Hay family has ensured that the memory of Stephen remains a part of our school's enduring story. As we reflect on this example of heartfelt giving, we are inspired by the many other generous acts that continue to shape The Hutchins School. Every gift, whether large or small, makes a difference. It strengthens our community, provides opportunities and supports the vision of a brighter future for our students. 🌟

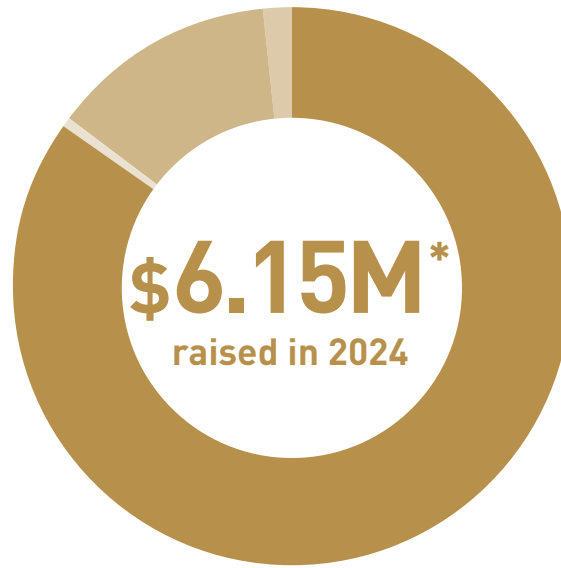
Reports of use to date indicate that "the Stephen Hay Memorial Park" will fill a large gap in the school facilities for outdoor education.
